5 STEPS TO CREATE AND SHARE A LINEAGE CHART

Did you know you can create a printed, sharable lineage chart (showing your direct ancestors in a "tree" formation) with the snap of a finger? Well, at least in 5 quick steps that should take a minimum of 5 minutes each:



- 1) Create a free account at familysearch.org (keep your user/password handy)
- 2) Enter basic info for yourself (all info for living people are ONLY viewable to YOU)

Enter what you know for 3) and 4):

- 3) Enter your parents birth and marriage (and death, if applicable) dates and places
- 4) Enter your grandparents birth and marriage (and death, if applicaable) dates and places

5) At the bottom right of any person's screen, you'll see the "PRINT" section. While viewing YOUR PAGE, click on print and select "Family Chart." HAVE FUN with the different styles!



CHURCH HISTORY: THIRD STREET CHURCH OF GOD

Dolores Rush, a regular contributor to eGenerations wrote: "In the church I grew up in, a sister congregation was the Third Street Church of God that was/is an African-American congregation. Our church would invite them over for a Singspiration event on Sunday evening and afterwards we had a fellowship. Boy, those Sisters could cook. Well, I found a Third Street Church of God fundraiser cookbook for sale at the Savers in Shawnee Mission, KS. Couldn't believe I found it clear out there, but I grabbed it. Thought I might ask if you would want a transcription of all the names of the people in the cookbook? It was published about 1985."



"I remembered another church - Hillcrest Church of God. It broke off the church I grew up in and is in Muncie, KS, First Church of God (was on Shawnee Drive, KS City, KS) and then on the

Missouri side was the Pittman Road Church of God. and then 3rd Street Church of God in Kansas City, KS."

JANIE PORTER BARRETT (1865-1948)

On this date, Janie Porter Barrett was born in 1865. She was an African American welfare worker and educator. Barrett developed a school to rehabilitate previously incarcerated African American girls by improving their self-reliance and discipline.

The daughter of former slaves, born in Athens, Ga., Barrett grew up largely in the home of the cultured white family who employed her mother. She graduated from Hampton Institute (Virginia) in 1884 and worked for five years as a teacher before establishing an informal day-care school in her home in Hampton. Her school grew rapidly, and in 1890 it was formally organized as the Locust Street Social Settlement, the nation's first settlement house for African-Americans. In 1902 she and her husband built a separate structure on their property to house the settlement's numerous activities, which included clubs, classes in domestic skills, and recreation; many of these activities were funded by Northern philanthropists.

In 1908 Barrett founded and became president of the Virginia State Federation of Colored Women's Clubs. Through the federation she worked to raise money for a residential industrial school for young African-American girls who had been incarcerated. In 1914 a 147-acre farm at Peake (also known as Peaks Turnout) was purchased, and in January 1915 the Virginia Industrial School for Colored Girls opened with 28 students. With help from many prominent social workers and especially from the Russell Sage Foundation, the school developed a program that stressed self-reliance and self-discipline, visible rewards, "big-sister" guidance, and close awareness to individual needs, as well as academic and vocational instruction.

In 1915 Barrett became the school's superintendent. She personally conducted the parole system by which girls who demonstrated sufficient responsibility were placed in carefully selected foster homes, given employment, and supported by such follow-up services as ministerial direction, a newsletter (The Booster), and personal letters. In 1920 the state of Virginia assumed financial responsibility for the school. Supervision was shared by the state and the women's club federation until 1942, when it became solely a function of the Virginia Department of Welfare and Institutions.

Barrett retired as superintendent in 1940 and died in 1948. In 1950, the school was renamed the Janie Porter Barrett School for Girls.






THOUGHTS AND PRAYERS
