

Professor Vaughan

Have you heard of Prof. Vaughan? Below is from Miller County, MO Historical Society's Facebook page, courtesy MAGIC friend Dolores Rush:

"ol' man river

He jes' keeps rolling along"

[Lyrics from the musical "Show Boat"]

In the 1800's entertainers came up with the idea to take the theater on boats to the people near river towns that were too remote to be reached by traveling companies. The boat would fire a cannon as it neared a landing to let people know there would be a show. The cannon was later replaced by a calliope.

It was July 1892 and the Miller County paper announced that the steamer Frederick had arrived, towing Vaughan's Show Boat. The troupe on the show boat gave performances on Saturday and Sunday night.

The Kansas City Times had interviewed Professor Vaughan in May as he prepared to leave on the 1892 "catfish theater" season. "Professor Vaughan's Comedy Company was composed of the professor, his wife Mollie, their two little girls, two comedians - Charles Kelly and W. C. Clark, and a box of monkeys.

Prof. Vaughan had been working the rivers for 15 years. In the winter he built vessels for the next season with the help of the comedians. They built the boats along the Kaw River near Kansas City. 'We aim to start down the river about May and play at all the small landings where no railroad shows stop. The trip usually takes about seven months. The first two months are along the Missouri and Osage Rivers, the next two between St. Louis and Memphis, and the last three between Memphis and New Orleans. There ain't no money in the south until cotton pickin' and therefore we don't go there until the people have money to squander, never earlier than September.' The boat would be sold when they reached New Orleans, winding up business for the year. The boat built for the 1892 season was 40 feet long, large enough to carry the tent and scenery with sufficient room for bunks and a small quantity of household effects. It was propelled by electric motor power. (Once the boat came down the Missouri River to the mouth of the Osage, it would need to be towed upriver on the Osage. Thus, the need for the Frederick.) One of the men would act as an advance agent, preceding the boat in a skiff a few days before the performance. His job was to learn about the people and put up bills in the communities. There were a variety of performances to choose from and some landings had crowds with a tendency to throw eggs when the choice didn't suit their fancy. Some of the performances were 'Pygmalion and Galatea,' 'Ten Nights in a Barroom,' and 'Fogg's Ferry.' If the advance man might not be around when

the boat arrived, he would leave a letter with the local postmaster so when the company arrived

someone could pick up the letter explaining which side out they should set the reversible scenery. The company used one set for all the plays." [Excerpts from the Kansas City Times, May 8, 1892] "As a little girl, my mother used to take me down to the show boats that used to come down the river. They had concerts, vaudeville, plays, melodrama, comedy, tragedy - every kind of amusement you can think of, and it was the delight of my life to go." [Mrs. David H. Kincheloe, St. Louis Globe Democrat, December 23, 1917]

Edna Ferber completed her novel "Show Boat" in 1926 and it was quickly adapted into a stage musical. The 1951 film version of the musical has become a classic.

- 1) Create a free account at <u>familysearch.org</u> (keep your user/password handy)
- 2) Enter basic info for yourself (all info for living people are ONLY viewable to YOU)

Enter what you know for 3) and 4):

- 3) Enter your parents birth and marriage (and death, if applicable) dates and places
- 4) Enter your grandparents birth and marriage (and death, if applicable) dates and places
- 5) At the bottom right of any person's screen, you'll see the "PRINT" section. While viewing YOUR PAGE, click on print and select "Family Chart." HAVE FUN with the different styles!


